

ADVISED TO LEAVE PORT PIRIE

RUSSIAN & WIFE SENT TO GAOL

On Saturday Constables V. V. Kennedy and F. W. Ferguson arrested Michael and Maggie Ankudinow, aged 29 and 21 years respectively, for having insufficient means of support, and being deemed to be idle and disorderly. They later appeared before Mr. D. C. Scott, S.M., at the Police Court, and both pleaded guilty.

Ankudinow stated that he was a Russian, and had served with the A.I.F. for four years. Afterwards he had obtained a good position in a post office in Ireland, where he was married. He returned to Australia with his wife, and had been working at Baroota until last Thursday. Maggie Ankudinow, who was well dressed and rather good-looking, asked for another chance.

Sergeant Bond stated that there were previous convictions, as follows:— At the Supreme Court, Adelaide, nine months' imprisonment for man and wife on charges of larceny in May, 1920, and at the Adelaide Police Court the wife was convicted on a charge of larceny in March of this year. Opportunities had been given to the accused

...in March of this year. Opportunities had been given to the accused to leave Pirie, but they had ignored them. The defendants had been going round the town and imposing on people.

The magistrate, in sentencing each of the accused to two months in gaol, advised them not to return to Port Pirie. "Do you think I am a leper?" asked Ankudinow as he left the dock.
