
BODY OF MISSING MAN RECOVERED

Found at Lock 5 a Week After Disappearance

The body of Jacob Nevola, who disappeared and was feared drowned at Renmark on February 29, was recovered from the river at Lock 5, three miles down stream, by P.C. Adams and P.C. Colmer on Wednesday. It was first seen by Mr. G. Albanus, assistant lock master, who reported the matter to Sergeant Rosenberg.

Nevola was 50 years of age, and came out from Finland, his homeland, in 1913 in a sailing vessel. When the Great War broke out he enlisted in the A.I.F. and served in France, where he was gassed. It is reported that he has a daughter living in Adelaide. When it was found that deceased was a returned man, the Renmark R.S.L. sub-branch made arrangements with Mr. R. Douglass for his interment. This took place today, the coffin being covered with the Union Jack. The service was conducted by the Rev. L. W. Slade, of the Church of England, of which deceased was a member.
