

## **MAN AGED 64 GAOLED Use Of Knives "To Be Discouraged"**

Sentencing a man to gaol on an assault charge, the magistrate said that people from other countries must learn that the use of knives was discouraged in Australia.

Imprisonment for two months was ordered Charles Nickolas Uppeneek, 64, cycle builder, of Magill road, Stepney, when he was found guilty of having unlawfully assaulted Detective B. R. Harvey at Stepney on the night of July 22.

Mr. G. V. Culshaw appeared for Uppeneek, who had denied the charge.

Assistant Police Prosecutor Radcliffe prosecuted.

At a previous hearing Detective Harvey said that with Plainclothes Constable O'Malley, he visited the home of defendant.

During a search of the premises they seized a quantity of liquor.

Uppeneek got annoyed, picked up a carving knife and threatened Detective Harvey.

A further charge against Uppeneek that on July 25, at the Detective Office, he unlawfully used indecent language within the hearing of Detective Harvey was adjourned until next Thursday.
