

### INSULTING BEHAVIOR.

Isaac Lazarus, a foreigner, was charged with insulting behavior. Constable Hooley and Senior-Constable Taylor stated that when returning from the Miners' races on Friday they heard defendant calling out to them to come and arrest some youths. Lazarus was very excited and his language was plentifully garnished with cathes. Hooley warned him to go home, but defendant followed him, and catching Taylor by the arm swung him round and demanded his number. He was then locked up. Lazarus pleaded that he had not insulted any one. He had, he said, obtained the sole right to sell fruit on the course, and finding another man doing the same thing he complained to the stewards, but without effect. He then asked the police to take the interloper in charge, which they failed to do. On the way out of the course some one struck his wife, and he again sought the protection of the police unavailingly. This, however, was all denied by the constables, and the bench fined Lazarus 20s. in default seven days, whereupon defendant calmly handed all his money to his wife and went off to gaol.
