THREE HOME ON SATURDAY.

The three soldiers were then motored to the Town Hall, where they were heartily cheered by a large number of assembled citizens. They were motored home in Mr. Laver's car.

Pte D. J. Gill, 24th Machine Gun Company, is a son of Mrs. J. C. Gill, Port Pirie South. He was a prisoner of war for nine months. Prior to leaving Pirie he was in Mr. Laver's employ.

Pte A. Tolparoff, 50th Battalion, has been away just over three years. He served in France and was a prisoner of war for seven months, being released on Anzac Day, 1918.

Pte E. J. Law, 48th Battalion, served in France for two years. The three soldiers are looking well, notwithstanding the hardships they have endured.
